Dear Brother:-

I have written you in a recent letter in regard to the illustrated Bible ~~history~~ <sup>story book</sup> which is now being issued at the Review & Herald office; I would now like to request that this matter be not taken up, or mentioned in any way, in either yours or mother's correspondence with the Review office. I think it would be better for our work if this plan be followed. I find that my book will be so superior in every way, that I have practically nothing to fear from their production.

We are going forward rapidly with the work on this book, and expect to have complete books in September.

I am also preparing a primer for church-school, and other use, which promises to be the finest thing ever produced. I will send you pages of it as soon as I can.

Now, my brother, in your last letter to me, you again started up the matter of Miss Andre being called from the school at Huntsville. I did not intend to mention the matter again for I see it is bound to involve some unpleasant things. In your previous letter I notice what you say

about her statement that she felt a call for Australia and did not feel a burden for this Southern work. This so astonished me that I thought I would never mention the matter again. Every statement that I made is susceptible of proof from letters written by herself and in possession of Elder Irwin; at least so Elder Irwin informs me. At Huntsville I am told she left with the greatest reluctance, and told them she felt no burden to leave America for Australia, and did feel a great burden for that school at Huntsville, and that she was not reconciled to the transfer at that time, and that she cried over the matter considerably. Now, you have the thing for all it is worth; and if it was in that situation, as I have stated, the arbitrary calling her away by cable message was entirely contrary to instruction received from mother in such cases just as I stated to you. With this I leave the matter, and can say I do not understand it, for I had full evidence of the situation before I wrote in the first place. I think the best thing to do will be to let it drop right where it is.

Emma is not very well just now, but is taking some special treatment with electricity which I think is helping her. My health is quite good at present and I hope to be able to do some good, solid work when I get to Nashville. Just at present I am overwhelmed with work, and am glad to say that I am getting along with it quite satisfactorily.
