August 23, 1875

Dear Willie,

I received a line from you today. I hope my pointed letter will do good, and no harm. I have no connection with Review and Herald Office nor with Health Institute. And now, will do what I can for the Signs, especially after camp meetings. Times are hard and money scarce. I can get but few subscribers at present. I am doing well on money for Press, types, etc., to furnish the Signs office.

Please send only fifty copies of Signs to the other camp meetings. I will do all I can in every way for the Signs office and the Signs. I will try to furnish copy.

I am invited by your uncle Samuel to speak to his people. We leave in the morning (Tuesday, 24) for his place to speak in the evening. Then we go to South Lancaster Camp meeting.

Brother Butler gave good evidence of breaking down, and coming out right. When we left he was going to Allegan, and we have some hope of Brother Littlejohn. You can form no idea of the amount of work I did in two weeks at Battle Creek. I astonished myself. Your mother and the writer are greatly blest and free at this meeting. We are having an excellent meeting here. The Bourdeaus will give themselves to the French under the General Conference. I think Elder Canright will take this field. The Vermonters will come up well and stand by any good man.

We shall rush from the Kansas meeting to you as soon and as fast as possible. We long to see you, and expect to meet you Will, being in health and hope and good courage.
